If you'd like to have a careers chat with Dave:


- Drop into the Careers Centre in the library
- Visit the Careers and Pathway Counselling page under "For Students" or "For Parents & Community" on the College website. Simply select a date and time on the calendar and entering your name and email (with option to enter mobile). There is also an option to enter any specific information for the appointment, such as wanting help with a resume or help applying for university. This helps Dave prepare information for the appointment. Appointments are scheduled for 30 minutes and availability varies from day to day due to Dave's commitments at our feeder high schools. Students and parents/carers can use the booking appointment function to arrange a time to meet with Dave for help with any careerrelated matters.

AREYOU CONNECTED & ON TRACK?

Some students have changed courses since the start of the year and perhaps you have been reassessing options beyond college. Now is a good time to explore those options and make sure you have the information you need, or at least know where to find it. It has been great to talk to a number of students already who have sought guidance and reassurance about their career and pathway plans. Maybe you found a subject too hard, changed to a different level and now you are concerned about the implications for further study or employment. Perhaps you're thinking about a vocational pathway and not sure what training is best for you or where to find information. Be sure to ask questions and find out so you can clarify any concerns you may have!

Apart from having a chat with Dave, teachers, family, friends and others in your network, there will be various opportunities during the year to gather information through visits by Universities, TasTAFE, Defence Recruiting and Apprenticeship/Traineeship organisation representatives, guest speakers, work experience opportunities and from our Careers Expo which will be held on 28th July.

Remember that it's ok if you don't have a particularly clear idea of your future options. The end of Year 12 does not have to determine the rest of your life and what you can achieve! It's great to have goals and a plan, but if things don't work out as you'd hoped, there are always alternative pathways. You will very likely have several jobs, potentially across various career areas, so be flexible and keep your options open!

UNIVERSITY PATHWAYS

To gain an ATAR (Australian Tertiary Admission Ranking), students need to attain the Tasmanian Certificate of Education (TCE) and pass a minimum of four, but preferably five, pre-tertiary subjects. At least three of these must be studied, and passed, in Year 12. This would all have been discussed in course counselling.

Students should be aware of pre-requisite and recommended subjects for the degree they're interested in, bearing in mind they can vary across the different states and universities. Remember to research the many available scholarships which can provide financial and accommodation assistance. There will be information provided about mainland universities throughout the year, and students can see Dave for help they need, particularly in relation to course requirements and applications.

UNIVERSITY OF TASMANIA RECOMMENDATION PROGRAM

The UTAS Schools Recommendation Program will run again in a similar way this year as it did in 2020 in response to the disruption caused by Covid-19. Year 12 students can submit applications for undergraduate degrees, double degrees and associate degrees from 31st May and receive offers in July. Following mid-year assessments, college teachers will provide recommendations, and these will be considered together with Year 11 results. This means students do not have to rely on a particular ATAR and know they have their place confirmed, subject to completing Year 12 with satisfactory results. University staff will visit the college regularly to help students choose the right course and to assist with their application. UNIVERSITY PATHWAYS

UNIVERSITY CLINICAL APTITUDE TEST

The UCAT is a two-hour computer-based test to assess a range of abilities for students wishing to study medicine or dentistry. Universities/degrees requiring UCAT are listed at: https:// www.ucat.edu.au/ucat-anz/universities/ Testing dates are between 1st July and 11th August and students need to book a test before 17th May. VOCATIONAL PATHWAYS

If you're considering a practical course that will lead to a career in the workforce or a pathway to higher education, then TAFE or an apprenticeship/ traineeship might offer what you're looking for.

Qualifications include certificates (from levels I to IV), diplomas and advanced diplomas, which can be completed on their own or in combination with onthe-job training with an employer. This training may be part of an apprenticeship or traineeship. They are available in a range of areas, from trades to business, health, creative arts and hospitality.
