INCLUSIVE PRACTICES AT EC

Elizabeth College's focus on student wellbeing and engagement puts our students at the centre of all our efforts. As part of supporting student wellbeing, we recognise that some learners, such as those impacted by trauma, may need additional support to ensure they can engage in learning. The aim of trauma-informed practice is to provide a school environment which offers safety, predictability and belonging, which are key elements to helping students engage in learning. Evidence shows that a whole-school focus on trauma-informed practices supports improved academic and wellbeing outcomes, not only for students with complex trauma backgrounds, but for all students.

This year, we will focus on:

- Determining the trauma-informed practice focus for school
- Developing and implementing a whole-school Action Plan to build capacity to support an inclusive school community
- Developing inclusive education practices through professional learning for all staff
- Promoting and ensuring a safe school environment, including wellbeing of students and staff

SPOTLIGHT ON CHINESE

Chinese study at Elizabeth College has been productive and fun in Term 1. Chinese language students have not only gained language communication skills but have also received many opportunities to explore and experience Chinese culture. Students started the year by focusing on the Chinese Lunar New Year. Students enjoyed traditional activities such as paper-cutting and made Chinese New Year dumplings.

Tasmania has a long-term sister-state relationship with Fujian Province in China. To celebrate 40 years of their connection, a number of official and cultural activities took place in mid-December 2021. These included the Art Exhibition – Impression of Tasmania and Fujian Art Exhibition at Wrest Point. Five Elizabeth College students' artworks were included in the exhibition.





ALTERNATIVE PROGRAMS

With an individualised and differentiated suite of offerings, Elizabeth College's Alternative Programs supports over 60 students this year. A strong and caring culture has been established through a welcoming space for students, including a large and comfortable teaching area, a recreational room with 8-ball tables and table tennis and kitchen/chill-out space.

Over the next two years at college, Alternative Programs students will study TASC courses Pathways to Work, Personal Care, You, Your Family and the Community, Financial Literacy, Building Connections, Career and Life Planning, and Outdoor Experiences. Every-day numeracy and literacy skills will be taught through real life scenarios such as the ASX Share Market Game and students will also have the opportunity to obtain nationally recognised qualifications such as First Aid and Responsible Service of Alcohol.



STUDENT SERVICES

The Student Services team are highly trained specialists who support and assist students facing a range of issues at college. The team is made up of counsellors, youth workers, psychologists, a social worker, an Aboriginal Education Worker, a careers counsellor, a security officer, support teachers and school nurses. Student Services is located in the terraced house, Nangaree, next to the main office on Elizabeth Street.

Our qualified team offer confidential counselling for a range of personal issues, focusing on mental health and wellbeing as well as organising referrals to outside agencies. We support students with their transition to college, providing course counselling, study skills and advice on managing workload. School psychologists provide educational assessments and recommendations for students who have specific learning difficulties. Our careers counsellor, located in the college library, can provide advice on a wide range of pathways, including university, TAFE, apprenticeships, job applications and work experience.

Over the course of the year, the team will present to Home Groups about the who, what, where and why of Student Services, along with information focusing on Respectful Relationships.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS SUMMER PROGRAM

In 2021 international students were unable to come to Elizabeth College due to travel restrictions and instead studied online from their home countries. It was a challenge for both students and teachers to ensure that these students acquired the knowledge and skills necessary to progress to Year 12 in 2022 when they were allowed entry into Tasmania. To help satisfy the practical requirements of their Physical Sciences 3 course, students arrived at Elizabeth College a week before Term 1 began and conducted their science experiments for four days. This practical science program was conducted by EC's highly regarded former Learning Area Manager of Science, Dr Deborah Beswick. The students thoroughly enjoyed the classes conducted by Deborah and benefited greatly from



the program. They were joined by four current and former international students who acted as assistants to Deborah. It was fantastic to see our more experienced students interact with the online students and help them get the most out of the program. We look forward to working with our international students in 2022.



NEW SUBJECT – TASMANIAN ABORIGINAL STUDIES

Elizabeth College is proud to be offering Tasmanian Aboriginal Studies for the first time. This new course has proven very popular, with 29 students undertaking the Level 2 subject. The subject is an exciting development for the college and presents both Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal students with an incredible opportunity to learn more about

Tasmanian history, key Aboriginal figures, Aboriginal culture and contemporary issues and events.

So far, students have been looking at the importance of language and place, considering Aboriginal place names and dual names in lutruwita/Tasmania. It is going to be an exciting and action-packed year, with plans for guest speakers and a range of excursions!

OUTDOOR EDUCATION

Outdoor Education students in Lines I and 5 have had an adventurous start to the year with a mixture of aquatic-based and team-building practical activities designed to prepare them for the year ahead. These included a water safety and rescue lesson where students learnt how to correctly 'wet exit' a kayak in preparation for Sea Kayaking on their approaching camp, and two sea level traverses which involved rock hopping, scrambling, swimming and jumping around the coastline north and south of Blackmans Bay Beach. Jumping off Soldiers Rock from various levels was a highlight for many, pushing their own personal limits and expanding comfort zones. The core unit of 'Personal Development' in Outdoor



Education has been explored with students stepping up to challenges, and they have already impressed teachers with their willingness to take on challenges and support one another through difficulties.

PIPPIN

We are excited to announce that rehearsals are well underway for this year's college musical, *Pippin*. Auditions have concluded and the cast has been announced. The band have started rehearsing under the guidance of Les Johnston and are sounding fantastic. Cast members are collaborating with the costume designer to design clothing that reflects their characters. Technical Theatre students have designed the set and started construction. Staff and students have also been working tirelessly on the opening number of the show, 'Magic to Do', which promises to be an absolute show-stopper!

The story is told by a troupe of performers, guided by the Lead Player, as Pippin finishes his education, finds his way through a war, has a disagreement with his father's rulings, and searches for love.
