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FROM THE PRINCIPAL

This week students and parents/carers will receive the first formal report for the year that focuses on work habits: punctuality, completion of set tasks, commitment/attitude and participation. Of course, student assessment and feedback about progress is ongoing and this report should not contain any surprises. I often say to students how important the qualities identified as desirable work habits are; prospective employers look carefully at the work habits component of any report as they give them an insight into the character of the person. For students wanting to pursue a tertiary pathway, these qualities set up positive routines that bring about academic success. TASC exams for Level 3 students start Week 4 of Term 4 (Nov 7th). This may sound a long way away but the reality is that we are over one quarter of the way through our academic year. I encourage our students to plan to succeed as we know that reaching goals does not happen without prior thought and then dedication and hard work.

You may have seen the Every School Day Matters campaign which emphasises the importance of students attending school every day and engaging in all lessons. As we work towards all students attaining a TCE, attending and engaging with peers and teachers is critical to building knowledge, skills, understanding and enhancing wellbeing. SUPPORTING OUR YOUNG PEOPLE

Our dedicated and experienced Student Services team offer a wide range of support to young people enrolled at EC to help them stay 'Connected and On Track' with their education. Anyone can refer a young person to Student Services, via a QR code, and a member of the team will follow up within a few days. The team is based in 'Nangaree', the red brick building next to the main administration building on Elizabeth Street.

• Sarah Newcombe is Admin Support and intake worker for Student Services and she is the first point of contact for young people and their families and teachers when they enter the building.

- Our School Psychologists are Alana Czerniawski (Monday – Thursday) and Rebecca Strong (Friday). They offer educational testing, psych support, general counselling, and facilitate the process for applying for 'Reasonable Adjustments' for TASC exams.
- Nathan Wilson is our Social Worker and is here Mondays, Thursdays and Fridays, offering social work and counselling support.
- We have three counsellors offering general counselling support throughout the week -Dee Morgan, Jane Shearing and Sandy Verrier.
- Our School Health Nurses, Jesse Blackaby and Tayla Wagner, are on campus on Monday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. Their role is to manage medical plans and provide education about a range of health issues.
- Dave Newcombe is an experienced Careers Advisor and manages a large part of the transition process from HCHS. He also plays a role in managing attendance.
- Damian Stolp is a Support Teacher offering a range of supports to students with disabilities and students with additional needs and their teachers and teacher assistants. Amelia Boughton and Marie-Rose Genovese are also supporting Damian in this role this year.
- Jon Klapsis is our Campus Support Manager. Jon is very engaged with students and staff. He is a very experienced support on the ground and enhances the security of our college.
- Narelle Traill works Monday and Tuesday at EC and Wednesday – Friday at HCHS, working with our attendance and engagement team.
- Rebecca Wilson offers Assistant Principal support to the team.

SETTING GOALS IN HOME GROUP

At Elizabeth College we believe that building a sense of community is important. 'Connected and On Track', our Home Group program, is an important part of the pastoral care program at EC. This year, students meet twice a week with their Home Group teacher, at noon on Mondays and Wednesdays. Students have been placed in a Home Group with one of their teachers. Cluster Assemblies for all Home Groups have been a feature of Term I. During these gatherings all Home Groups met with the Assistant Principal responsible for their Home Group.

As part of being 'Connected and on Track', throughout Term 1 students have been working with their Home Group teachers to complete a personalised Learning Plan for 2023. This plan is about identifying strengths, interests and cultural connections, as well identifying personal and learning goals students would like to achieve by the end of the year. Students have been challenged to think about what steps they need to take and what help they might need to achieve their goals.

Learning Plans will be sent home to parents and carers at the end of term and if parents feel there is something they would like to add they are encouraged to contact Home Group teachers to chat further. As the year progresses, students will have an opportunity to review their Learning Plan and discuss their progress towards the set goals.



NIFTY NURSES



Elizabeth College is fortunate to have two School Health Nurses again this year. Jesse and Tayla's roles are health education, promotion and working in the preventive health space. Education can include but is not limited to; sexual health, mental health, healthy sleep habits, overall health, quitting smoking & vaping, respectful relationships, consent education and helping students to access external health services.

This year Jesse and Tayla have plans to present to all Home Groups about topical health-related issues. They also both facilitate Enrichment groups (Pride Group and Health Promotion) and will organise health expos and community health promotions throughout the year.

The nurses are available to meet with students for one-on-one support and answer questions. They are located in Nangaree, the Student Services building.

INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY

They were treated to a new tour which focuses on the strength and resilience of convict women, hearing true stories of women who spent time at Cascades. The 'Wall of Women' photographic installation was a highlight, where 24 portraits of women whose diverse stories and connections to Cascades Female Factory are linked through their courage and amplification of the often-silenced voices of women of the past. To finish, students were invited to write a message to a convict woman which were then displayed on the arrival gates, the place where convict women entered the establishment nearly 200 years ago.

French is once again being chosen by students at EC! This year the college is offering classes for Level 2 (beginners) and Level 3, which is a nice mix of students who took the beginner's class last year or who studied French at high school; there are also students who have done exchanges in France and French-speaking Canada, as well as two exchange students from Switzerland (where French is one of four national languages, and where teacher, Adam Shaw, lived for many years). In each course students learn to



express themselves in French and speak about their lives, views, hobbies and future plans. They learn about young people in French-speaking countries and consider the differences between how they live and how we live in Australia. For example, did you know that students in France all learn to handwrite in the exact same style? Or that they get a three-course meal for lunch at school every day? Students also consider social issues in Frenchspeaking countries, politics, pop culture, arts and entertainment, the world of work and potential opportunities for travelling, studying and working abroad.



ECAAD ADVENTURES

In late February, 62 ECAAD (Elizabeth College Advanced Academic Diploma) students headed to the Tasman Peninsula for an overnight camp. First stop was Clifton Beach where students took part in activities such as surf lessons, playing beach cricket and a very competitive sandcastle-building competition.
