overwhelmingly, our students who are in class are interested and engaged in their learning. The other aspect that is interesting is the range of issues/concepts/skills being taught on a daily basis around our college.

Of course, this term there have been many highlights: the 60 students who received Outstanding Academic Achievement Awards after the May reports, students shining in the Footloose musical, students performing at the Generations in Jazz Festival, our Pride Group students raising awareness for IDAHOBIT and the list goes on. I thank the students who care about Elizabeth College and its community, and those who value education. ### **IDAHOBIT**

The Elizabeth College Pride Group held a free badge stall in honour of IDAHOBIT. This is an important day for the college community to stand together against LGBTQIA+ discrimination. IDAHOBIT stands for the International Day against Homophobia, Biphobia, Intersexism and Transphobia. It marks the day in 1990 when the World Health Organisation declassified homosexuality as a disease. It is a day of awareness about working towards eliminating LGBTQIA+ discrimination. The Pride Group were busy making badges specific to different LGBTQIA+ identities and enjoyed educating staff and students about the meaning behind each.



### AS I SEE IT

As I See It was an exhibition of artworks by all students studying Visual Arts at EC this year. It was an open themed exhibition with students expressing individual ideas and imagery. The big focus this term has been preparing for NAIDOC week, which occurred in the last week of term. Legal Studies 3 students prepared information on The Voice to Parliament to share with the college community at our NAIDOC week assembly. The Yarning Collective has also been working with staff to build confidence in including Indigenous content in their teaching and beginning our college's Reconciliation Action Plan journey.





### WRINKLING TIME IN DRAMA

Earlier in the term, Drama 2 and 3 students presented the children's classic A Wrinkle in Time, originally written by Madeleine L'Engle and adapted for the stage by Morgan Gould. This colourful production took the audience on a galaxy adventure from Uriel and Camazotz to 'Wrinkle Time'. During rehearsals the students actively took part in workshops,

learning about Strasberg, Boal and Lecoq acting techniques. As well as playing a variety of individual characters, students had to work closely as an ensemble to create the settings for each scene. Audiences enjoyed the whirlwind of colour and lively characters and the Drama students gained valuable experience in working together as an ensemble.

### NEW COURSE – CERTIFICATE II IN ELECTROTECHNOLOGY

VET course, Certificate II in Electrotechnology (Statement of Attainment) is being offered at EC for the first time this year! This hands-on course provides students with the opportunity to be at the front of the queue when applying for apprenticeships in the fields of electrotechnology, electrical, and other sustainable and communication fields. The math requirement of this certificate is traditionally one of the hardest units for apprentice electricians to pass, and can be a hurdle to them gaining their final qualification. For this reason, teacher Tim Price has been emphasising this aspect for students. This term the class have also completed the WHS unit, solved single path circuits and attached components to various structures, including plasterboard, wall studs and timber frames. Students are gathering valuable skills and the confidence to gain employment in an in-demand industry!



## takara nipaluna

On a sunny Friday afternoon during Reconciliation Week, the Tasmanian Aboriginal Studies class and one English 3 class were lucky enough to participate in the takara nipaluna (Walking Hobart) tour. This tour follows the route taken in 1832 by members of the Aboriginal Resistance, retracing

their steps as they progressed to old Government House to negotiate an end to the Black War. It was an incredible experience, allowing students and teachers to begin to understand some of the complexities of Tasmanian Aboriginal history.



### INTRODUCING ARTIST IN RESIDENCE – DEAN STEVENSON

Dean Stevenson has been Artist in Residence at Elizabeth College for the last two terms. While also juggling his role at the Museum of Old and New Art (MONA) five days a week, Dean has generously dedicated his Wednesdays to inspiring EC's music students.
