- Be realistic about what you can commit to and your expectations of yourself. There is equally a risk in not challenging yourself to see what you are capable of.

- Each day is a new day to reset and a new opportunity to build on your knowledge, skills and confidence.

DECISION TIME FOR YEAR IIs




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FUTSAL FEVER




PATHWAYS TO SUCCESS
